Pioneer, Utah's Online Library, celebrates its 10th Year Anniversary this spring with a 50-word essay contest. Entries are due March 17, 2006.

Winners will be announced on Pioneer's 10th birthday, April 10, 2006. All Utahans are invited to participate. Just tell us in 50 words or less how the Pioneer Library benefits you at home, work or school. Submit your entry on paper to your local school, college or public library. Each local library (at your public school, college or public library) will award a Pioneer clock/calculator to the top entry. All of the top entries will then be submitted statewide for a drawing. Each of Pioneer's three partners (Utah State Library Division, the Utah State Office of Education, and the Utah Academic Library Consortium) will award a grand

prize of an Apple iPod nano on April 10th.

Pioneer, Utah's Online Library celebrates its 10th Year Anniversary this spring on April 10, 2006. Ten years ago Utah colleges, schools and public libraries formed the Pioneer Library to bring credible online resources to all Utahans.

Today, Pioneer receives thousands of visits each day from Utah students, teachers, and citizens of all ages. Pioneer brings Utahans free online access to magazines, journals, newspapers, encyclopedia, maps, pictures and multi-media clips.

Pioneer's key benefits are statewide access, credible resources and cost-effective delivery. For example Pioneer gives public school students statewide, online access to World Book. What would cost over \$1,000 dollars per school in hard copy form is available at no charge to K-12 student users.

## **Award Nominations Sought**

Do you know of any "unsung heroes" among you who deserve a song? Well, the fat lady is warming up so unless you want to hear a polka, you need to nominate those outstanding people you work with for an award from ULA.

The awards recognize outstanding achievement in librarianship, service to libraries and the library profession, and service to the Utah Library Association. Recipients may be librarians, trustees, legislators, news media personnel, and friends of libraries.

What constitutes award material? Contributions in leadership, creativity, pioneering effort, and teaching. They may have developed a library, extensively participated in local, state or national library bodies, developed statewide public relations campaigns beneficial to libraries, successfully implemented new ideas for library services, or provided innovations in the library world. Being a ULA member is not required.

## **ULA Distinguished Service Award**

This is the *crème de la crème*. Here is a person "whose achievements in service to libraries are of the highest caliber." You do not have to be a librarian to be eligible. Your accomplishments must "represent a sustained contribution over a period of several years."

#### Librarian of the Year Award

Must be a librarian (worked in library or media center or have been involved in library science education; not necessarily MLS). Outstanding service in recent past.

#### Special Service to Libraries Award

Honoring groups (library staffs, committees, library boards, similar library groups) or individuals who have made significant contributions in support of libraries or library service. Sustained contribution over several years or a notable effort over a shorter period of time.

#### ULA Special Recognition Award

Librarians (as defined above) who have "contributed to the profession as a whole and who have benefited the library community in general over a period of many years."



Through a new opportunity, I am now part of Westminster College's community of adjunct instructors. This has given me an entry into the world of academic librarians in Utah, through the wonderful facilities and resources provided by the college's Giovale Library. It's been a long time since I've been an academic librarian. eleven years, and things have certainly changed! The online resources provided by Utah's academic libraries are a true gift to students and scholars alike. During a recent orientation for new adjuncts, Reference/Instruction librarian Chuck Malenfant gave us an overview of the library's portal, databases, and online reference tools. I plan on taking full advantage of the offerings and relish this glimpse of the academic side.

The library itself is not new to me, though, thanks to past ULA President and Giovale Library Director David Hales' many invitations to ULA members to meet and visit there during his term as President.

David wrote the following:

The Giovale Library information commons houses the library, writing

center, and general computing lab, and is a place where students and faculty may engage in conversation, collaboration, and active learning in an area that supports their research and technology needs.

The Giovale Library holds approximately 123,710 books, and 355 current journal subscriptions in paper. Students have access to circa 22,900 electronic journals and 21,208 electronic books via online databases. Special services of the Library include a modern assistive technology lab, laptop access at all study stations, and wireless access throughout the building. Two media rooms provide the latest equipment to view videos, DVDs, and listen to CDs/tapes.

The writing center - close to the research and technology staff - is staffed by trained writing consultants who can help students develop their writing skills and enhance academic success, and the Information Commons Café is a designated area where drinks and snacks are available to help students maintain energy levels during study and research or just take a break.

The Giovale Library is an open learning environment where everyone is welcome to share his or her ideas.
